

SETAC Retraction Policy

Updated and approved 17 March 2016

Published articles, defined as articles assigned a DOI and posted online (Accepted Articles, Early View, or articles published in an issue), can be retracted for scientific or ethical reasons. A retraction can be initiated by the author(s) of the article or by one of the journal editors, but the final decision is at the discretion of the journal's Editor-in-Chief. A "Retraction Statement" containing the full bibliographic information (i.e., title, full list of authors, DOI) together with a detailed explanation for retraction will be published with the retracted article and on its own in a future issue. The article pdf will be denoted as retracted with a watermark and explicit web text, and will remain on the webpage. Both the original article and the retraction will crosslink, and be clearly joined. The retracted article will remain available on the journal webpage unless exceptional (e.g., legal) reasons require its removal. SETAC journals follow guidance from the Committee on Publication Ethics (COPE) when considering retractions (<http://publicationethics.org/files/retraction%20guidelines.pdf>)
